

Nonprofit Placement

- Staff works to develop and maintain partnerships with ~60 participating nonprofit organizations (~45 apply as hosts)
- Boards range in areas of focus, lifecycle stage, and size
- Placements are based on fellows' ability to make meaningful
 contributions and interest in the mission of a nonprofit organizations
- Fellows rank top 15 organizations, and we optimize the group's choices

We do our best to match fellows to their preferences but cannot guarantee that you will get your first choice.

Fellows serve on a nonprofit board as a board fellow, and serve their peers and help shape the program as a member of the Executive Committee.




EC Fellow Commitment – Second Year


What are we looking for?
